Cornwall's Freemasons help hospices

Cornwall Hospice Care received a welcome donation from The Freemason's Grand Charity of £3,458 this week. Notes to Editors

1. Since 1984 The Freemason's Grand Charity has donated over £8 million towards the operating costs of hospice services across England and Wales.
2. Cornwall Hospice Care has two hospices, St Julia's in Hayle and Mount Edgcumbe in St Austell. Both provide specialist medical care for people living with life limiting illnesses and give support to their families and carers. The care is provided free of charge to the patients. With limited Government funding, the charity relies heavily on the support of the general public and grants from Trusts and Foundations to raise more than £5million needed each year to ensure the continuation of its services.
